Time To Vote

The West Morris Regional High School District has a referendum regarding their budget on the ballot. The vote is set for Tuesday, March 12. If you are signed up to receive a Vote by Mail ballot you may have already received it. In Mendham Borough the polls will be open as they usually are on our Primary or General Election days. Just go to your regular voting location and vote in person the way you always do.

New State Legislation on Affordable Housing

On February 12, the State Assembly passed new affordable housing legislation by a 51 – 28 member vote. You can find the bill here: https://pub.njleg.state.nj.us/Bills/2024/A0500/4_R1.PDF.

The bill essentially dissolves COAH and gives the NJ Department of Consumer Affairs the authority to determine housing numbers for towns. The State Senate is expected to hear and vote on this bill by the end of February, which means by the time you are reading this newsletter a decision may have been made. The new law would give additional credits for supportive housing for people with special needs, along with some other opportunities to develop affordable housing while limiting dense development.

We will be posting a summary on our website for everyone's better understanding. I am also planning to host a Mayor's Roundtable to learn about what this new legislation could mean for Mendham Borough. The meeting will take place sometime in the month of March and details for the meeting will be posted and advertised for all interested parties to attend. Be prepared to register your attendance so we can arrange for a large enough room to accommodate all.

Thinking About a Major Home Project?

We have had some residents recently begin major yard projects, not realizing that there are approvals and permits that are required. Depending on the project, you may need both Borough, County and State approvals. One new factor that has increased the need for review and approval is the State stormwater regulations. These new regulations are complicated, so the best course of action is to reach out to

our engineering department for a thorough review. Failure to file with all of the appropriate offices can result in a fine. Don't just believe a contractor if they tell you that you don't need any approvals, because you could end up having to pay twice: once to do the work and once to undo it. Here is an example of just some of the requirements when it comes to moving soil:

For Mendham Borough the following require a lot grading permit from the Engineer:

- Any increase in lot coverage of 1,000 square feet or more
- ♦ Any soil disturbance of 2,500 square feet or more
- ♦ All new driveways require Engineer review
- Road openings require permits through Engineering department.

For the County:

 Any soil disturbance of 5,000 square feet or more requires a permit from Morris County Soil Conservation.

Remember, doing work on your own yard can have a big impact on stormwater flow or your neighbor's property. Get a review up front!

Phoenix House Restoration

We have officially moved out of the Phoenix House building and into the Bowers Building for at least the next 4-6 months. As a reminder, this is necessary to make room for the structural work that needs to be completed. Our staff is working in tight quarters, and they don't have immediate access to records, so patience would be appreciated. We are asking residents to schedule appointments if you need an inperson meeting. You can still drop off payments to the Bowers Building mailbox. During this process we know there will be some growing pains, so please don't hesitate to reach out if you need something.

Household Hazardous Waste

The MCMUA's permanent Household

Hazardous Waste (HHW) facility is located at its Mt. Olive transfer station; 168 Gold Mine Road, Flanders, NJ 07836.

Appointment may be scheduled online using the form below or by calling us at 973-829-8006. Please read the listing of acceptable materials below and call with any questions.

Please call to discuss large quantities of HHW prior to scheduling an appointment.

Acceptable Materials: adhesives ◆ aerosol cans ◆ asbestos (in small quantities, must be under 100 lbs., wet down, double-bagged, sealed with duct tape, and sized to fit into 55-gallon drums) ◆ automotive cleaning products ◆ automotive fluids such as oil, antifreeze and brake, diesel, transmission and steering fluids, etc. ◆ automotive used oil filters ◆ batteries for car, boat, motorcycles and/or ATVs (lead-acid) ◆ batteries, if they are rechargeable (NiCd, NiMH, Lithium-lon) and/or hazardous dry-cell batteries (button-cell and lithium). Alkaline batteries are not hazardous and are not accepted (put them

into the garbage) ♦ caulks ♦ caustic cleaning materials ♦ cooking oils (vegetable, peanut oil, etc. can be new or used) ♦ corrosive liquids and solids ♦ driveway sealant and roofing tar if they contain coal tar or petroleum distillates ♦ fire extinguishers ♦ flammable liquids (lighter fluid, diesel fuel) ♦ fluorescent light bulbs and CFLs (compact fluorescent lights) that contain mercury ♦ gasoline/diesel gas (must be transported in a certified gas can) ♦ household hazardous cleaning products must be considered hazardous but note, most are not hazardous. ♦ kerosene ♦ muriatic acid ♦ nail polish and nail polish remover (acetone) ♦ oil-based paints and varnishes, stains, lacquers (liquid or solidified) ♦ pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers (bug sprays, bug killers, home defense and repellents) ◆ photography and printing chemicals (fixers, toners and inks) ◆ pool chemicals and chlorine ♦ propane cylinders (BBQ-sized propane cylinders cost \$5/cyl. at the permanent HHW facility and there is no charge for camping stove-sized propane cylinders) ♦ solvents and paint thinners ♦ thermometers and thermostats containing mercury
